3	Education Officer. Thank you.	06:11:13
4	PRESIDENT CLARK: Thank you, Madam Secretary.	06:11:15
5	Let's begin with the amended budget presentation,	06:11:16
6	Ron Denard, please provide us with all this clear	06:11:20
7	and concise information.	06:11:26
8	MR. DENARD: Ron Denard, Senior Vice President	06:11:27
9	of Finance. Good evening, everyone. Good evening	06:11:30
10	President Clark, Vice President Guzman, and fellow	06:11:33
11	Board Members.	06:11:36
12	To start off, the CPS 2017 budget was	06:11:40
13	balanced, and I repeat, our budget was balanced	06:11:46
14	until we had a state funding veto by	06:11:49
15	Governor Rauner. That created a \$215 million hole	06:11:52
16	within our budget.	06:11:58
17	In order to resolve this issue, we are	06:12:03
18	taking the steps in phases. So Phase 1 will be to	06:12:06
19	reduce our budget by 104 million and -- reduce our	06:12:11
20	expenses and reduce our revenue by 104 million.	06:12:15
21	This will be accomplished by four furlough days	06:12:19
22	that were previously announced for 35 million.	06:12:23
23	There's 50 percent of the unspent nonpersonnel	06:12:27
24	school funds will be frozen. That would be	06:12:32

1 46 million. Centrally controlled professional 06:12:36
2 development, that will be cut by 5 million. And 06:12:38
3 the charters' share of the above reductions will be 06:12:42
4 18 million. Again, the charters will be reduced by 06:12:46
5 \$18 million. And then our revenue will be reduced 06:12:51
6 by 104. And so the balance is 111 million that 06:12:55
7 we're expecting, still expecting from the state. 06:13:01
8 So our amended budget, again, we will 06:13:10
9 reduce our spend by 104 million. That goes from 06:13:13
10 5.5 billion to 5.411 billion. That's our amended 06:13:16
11 budget spend. 06:13:23
12 There was an issue that arose at the 06:13:28
13 2 o'clock meeting, and we decided to -- it was a 06:13:31
14 discussion around SBB Title I and SGSA dollars. So 06:13:38
15 to clarify that, no Title I or SGSA funds will be 06:13:43
16 frozen or swept for the deficit reduction. 06:13:49
17 So we're going to use an example. So if a 06:13:53
18 school had unspent funds of SBB, student-based 06:13:56
19 budgeting funds of \$10,000, Title I of \$20,000, 06:14:01
20 this is the total available funds that have not 06:14:05
21 been spent. We take 50 percent of that, and that's 06:14:08
22 \$15,000. We're saying you must cover that in SBB 06:14:12
23 funds. So they only have \$10,000 of SBB funds 06:14:16
24 left. So they will freeze that and not spend that 06:14:22

1 \$10,000. Then they have a choice. They could 06:14:27
2 either use some of their Title I dollars for, for 06:14:31
3 instance, an after-school program that was 06:14:35
4 previously paid for by SBB, or they could cut 06:14:36
5 \$5,000 from some other SBB program such as programs 06:14:41
6 that are in open purchase orders that are 06:14:45
7 encumbered but have not been spent or overtime or 06:14:49
8 things alone those lines. 06:14:52
9 So we're not freezing any Title I or SGSA 06:14:54
10 dollars. It's just used in the calculation of the 06:14:58
11 total available funds. 06:15:00
12 PRESIDENT CLARK: Questions? Thank you very 06:15:03

17	imagine, probably not as upset as people were	06:16:38
18	earlier today because I heard that was a real fun	06:16:41
19	experience, but there's some things I think we need	06:16:45
20	to get into -- put into perspective, and that is	06:16:47
21	that we have to make all kinds of choices, but when	06:16:51
22	you make choices that hurt people, you have to be	06:16:57
23	held accountable for that. And that's one of the	06:17:04
24	problems of having an appointed school board and	06:17:06

1 having mayoral control, you know. 06:17:10

2 And waiting for Governor Rauner's cold, 06:17:14

3 evil heart to melt to me is just a waste of time 06:17:19

4 and energy when you've got other things you can be 06:17:25

5 doing, you know. You guys are going to have to 06:17:27

6 figure out a way to hold people here in Chicago 06:17:31

7 accountable, not just us, but we sat -- I mean, 06:17:35

8 Arnie, you were there. How long did we sit to 06:17:40

9 organize a new contract? And in that new contract 06:17:42

10 are ten paid professional development days. Oh, we 06:17:47

11 don't have money, so four of them are gone? Do you 06:17:52

12 not understand how important that is to -- not just 06:17:55

13 to us, but to our students, for us to have the 06:17:59

14 appropriate professional development? 06:18:03

15 I prided myself when I was a teacher on 06:18:06

16 being prepared all of the time. Because if you 06:18:09

17 don't have a plan for your kids, your kids will 06:18:12

18 have a plan for you. And those of you who have 06:18:15

19 been in classrooms know that. 06:18:18

20 We cannot deal with this destruction. All 06:18:21

21 of this special ed people, they are climbing -- and 06:18:26

22 we're getting the phone calls. And I'm -- 06:18:30

23 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Lewis. 06:18:34

24 MS. LEWIS: -- I'm going to start calling you 06:18:35

1	guys. I know my two minutes will be up.	06:18:36
2	SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you.	06:18:38
3	MS. LEWIS: I'm going to start calling you,	06:18:38
4	Frank. I've got your number. I'm going to put you	06:18:40
5	on blast. Forrest, you and I need to talk for	06:18:43

7	And I'm just going to say this. There are	06:18:46
8	other ways to get more creative about finding	06:18:52
9	money. There are 50 aldermen in this town with	06:18:55
10	multiple schools in each one of those wards. We	06:18:57
11	have to figure out a way to do this and it cannot	06:19:00
12	be just by cuts. You cannot cut your way to a good	06:19:04
13	system. You cannot do it.	06:19:07

15	PRESIDENT CLARK: Thank you very much, Karen.	06:19:11
16	SECRETARY BELTRAN: Our next speaker, please,	06:19:13

18	MS. GARCIA: (Through interpreter) My name is	06:19:22
19	Guadalupe Garcia. I am here because it's unfair to	06:20:15
20	cut funds for special education. I have a son in	06:20:21
21	special education and I have seen his great	06:20:24
22	progress.	06:20:27
23	So we need these funds for our children to	06:20:29
24	advance. We need the teachers. Rich corporations	06:20:32

1 downtown always have benefits. I think we should 06:20:36
2 tax the millionaires now and give that money to 06:20:40
3 special education. My son deserves this. Thank 06:20:44
4 you. 06:20:48
5 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you. Thank you, 06:20:49
6 Ms. Garcia. Our next speaker, please, will be 06:20:50
7 Speaker Number 1, Michelle Leon. As I call the 06:20:53
8 speakers, can you please stage to your left and 06:20:59
9 John will assist in placing you in the right order. 06:21:01
10 Please state your name. 06:21:10
11 MS. LEON: Hello. My name is Michelle Leon. 06:21:11
12 I'm sorry, do you mind if I take my time? I'm 06:21:18
13 still a little bit nervous. 06:21:21
14 SECRETARY BELTRAN: You'll have two minutes to 06:21:22
15 address the Board, honey, so you can start. 06:21:24
16 MS. LEON: Hello. Good afternoon. My name is 06:21:27
17 Michelle Leon. I'm a sophomore at Kelly High 06:21:30
18 School. 06:21:32
19 I'm a little upset about the budget cuts 06:21:33
20 because after all the fighting my friends and I 06:21:35
21 have done during this school year, during the past 06:21:38
22 school year, we still have to sacrifice. This was 06:21:41
23 a result of all the sacrifice that we did and of 06:21:46
24 all the press conferences that we've been to, of 06:21:49

1	all the rallies we've been to, after all the	06:21:52
2	walk-outs we've been preparing -- all the walk-outs	06:21:55
3	that we've been to. We've been organizing.	06:21:59
4	How come our budget still be cut after all	06:22:04
5	the sacrifice that we did? How come the students	06:22:07
6	still have to sacrifice? How come my principal	06:22:11
7	still has to choose between cutting one of our	06:22:13
8	programs or cutting after-school programs or	06:22:15
9	choosing between should we not be able to fund for	06:22:20
10	printer paper or should we not fund for new	06:22:26
11	schools?	06:22:29
12	It's not fair. It's really not fair	06:22:31
13	because there's other students in rich	06:22:34
14	neighborhoods that have more than us, and then	06:22:38
15	there's us who have to sacrifice our time to stay	06:22:40
16	after school and try to organize this so we could	06:22:46
17	have a better future.	06:22:50
18	It's also not fair that we have to hold in	06:22:53
19	our pee because we don't want to use public rest	06:22:55
20	rooms because there's three stalls that work, but	06:22:59
21	there's two stalls that don't have paper toilet.	06:23:02
22	It's also not fair that we still have to sit in	06:23:04
23	auditorium seats that been there since the 1950s.	06:23:08
24	They haven't been repaired. They're seats that are	06:23:12

1 broken, and then there's roof -- the ceiling is 06:23:14
2 like falling apart. 06:23:20
3 And it's not just my school. It's other 06:23:21
4 schools in this neighborhood. It's other schools 06:23:23
5 like Curie High School. 06:23:26
6 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Leon, can you please 06:23:28
7 conclude? 06:23:30
8 MS. LEON: I just think that the rich should 06:23:33
9 pay their fair share and then none of this will 06:23:37
10 happen. 06:23:39
11 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you. Our next 06:23:41
12 speaker, please. 06:23:42
13 PRESIDENT CLARK: Young lady, that's really 06:23:45
14 well said. I know people don't think we hear or 06:23:47
15 pay attention to what you say, but that's not true 06:23:50
16 at all, and we take into very serious consideration 06:23:51
17 everything that we hear. It's just that we're 06:23:59
18 always doing a balancing act. But I thought you 06:24:02
19 were excellent, and I just wanted to comment on it. 06:24:04
20 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you. Our next 06:24:07
21 speaker, Mr. President, will be Karina Martinez 06:24:08
22 followed by Speaker Number 3, Jesus Sanchez, and 06:24:11
23 Speaker Number 4, Edward Ford. 06:24:15
24 MS. MARTINEZ: Good afternoon. My name is 06:24:17

1	Karina Martinez, and I'm a senior from Curie High	06:24:21
2	School. I'm a student organizer with the Brighton	06:24:24
3	Park Neighborhood Council.	
4	These cuts may have never affected you,	06:24:28
5	but they have affected me. I've lost teachers, had	06:24:30
6	to sit in classes with more than 40 students and	06:24:33
7	not enough desks to sit in. I've had to sit in	06:24:36
8	leaking classrooms, and I've had to see massive	06:24:39
9	amount of bugs in my school.	06:24:42
10	These budget cuts have caused an increase	06:24:43
11	in violence in our communities. My school had two	06:24:44
12	deaths of students in a span of three months.	06:24:47
13	You may have cut the amount of funding in	06:24:51
14	my school, but not the determination of my	06:24:53
15	students. I've been accepted to over ten	06:24:55
16	universities with scholarships from seven. My	06:24:58
17	success is not due to you, but due to the passion	06:25:00
18	of my school, teachers, and administration.	06:25:02
19	The city chooses to fund sidewalks and	06:25:04
20	beautification projects instead of my education.	06:25:06
21	When you prioritize projects like this, you are	06:25:08
22	telling me that my education and the education of	06:25:10
23	so many other students in the system is not	06:25:13
24	important. You are not prioritizing the safety and	06:25:14

1 education of these students. All students, no 06:25:18
2 matter their race or ethnicity or any other 06:25:21
3 factors, should matter to you because real 06:25:25
4 sanctuary means protecting your students and 06:25:28
5 funding your schools. 06:25:29
6 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Ms. Martinez. 06:25:31
7 Our next speaker, please, Jesus Sanchez. 06:25:33
8 MR. SANCHEZ: Hi. My name is Jesus Sanchez, 06:25:39
9 and I'm a sophomore John Hancock High School. 06:25:44
10 I'm very disappointed that you have 06:25:46
11 allowed 64 -- \$46 million from us be cut and we're 06:25:48
12 not going to stand here and just take it. We are 06:25:53
13 here to fight for what is ours and that is a good 06:25:56
14 education. Education is our right and it is 06:25:58
15 important to all of us. We all have dreams and 06:26:02
16 aspirations. Mine is to one day become a doctor, 06:26:05
17 but how do you and the Governor expect us to do 06:26:08
18 well in school and go to college in order to reach 06:26:11
19 these dreams if we don't have the money -- if we 06:26:13
20 don't get the money we rightfully deserve to buy 06:26:18
21 books and improve our schools and the education of 06:26:21
22 its students? 06:26:23
23 You are not just affecting the CPS 06:26:24
24 district, you are affecting us, the teachers, the 06:26:26

1 staff and, most importantly, the students. 06:26:29
2 Textbooks, instruments, and the supplies that are 06:26:31
3 essential to student learning are not cheap, but we 06:26:34
4 still need them. How do you expect us to reach 06:26:36
5 your standards if we don't have a textbook in front 06:26:40
6 of us when we are learning? And all teachers have 06:26:43
7 to resort on making copies of a lesson from the one 06:26:47
8 book they have for their four to five crowded 06:26:50
9 classes. But they're not even -- they should not 06:26:52
10 -- but these budget cuts are real and affect basic 06:26:59
11 essentials. 06:27:03
12 Our schools -- and the school issue -- and 06:27:04
13 this shouldn't be an issue in our school, but sadly 06:27:09
14 it is. And how do they expect us to learn in these 06:27:12
15 conditions? It's not the Governor's fault. CPS 06:27:16
16 has the power to -- it's not only the Governor's 06:27:19
17 fault, but CPS. CPS has the power to do something, 06:27:22
18 and we need to stand up for what is right for the 06:27:25
19 students, the staff, and the teachers of CPS. 06:27:27
20 If you really do care about our education, 06:27:30
21 you would do everything in your power to do what's 06:27:33
22 necessary to help us. 06:27:36
23 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Mr. Sanchez. 06:27:38
24 Next speaker, please, Edward Ford. 06:27:42

1	(Chanting.)	06:27:54
2	SECRETARY BELTRAN: Please state your name.	06:28:03
3	MR. FORD: Good evening, Board. For those who	06:28:05
4	know me, how you doing? For those that don't know	06:28:11
5	me, my name is Edward Ford, and I'm a proud parent	06:28:13
6	of two Chicago Public School students, fourth and	06:28:16
7	third grade; fourth grade, Ronald H. Brown Academy;	06:28:22
8	third grade, Edgar Allan Poe, regular school,	06:28:25
9	selective enrollment.	06:28:28
10	The reason I say that, I have a son in	06:28:30
11	fourth grade. He come home and say, dad, I got 41	06:28:32
12	students in my classroom, one teacher. I'm not	06:28:36
13	learning really too much. But he still is a	06:28:40
14	straight A student. How are you not learning	06:28:44
15	nothing and you're a straight A student? So when I	06:28:47
16	look at him and we go by his education level, I	06:28:51
17	notice that our third grader is in a selective	06:28:55
18	enrollment school that is doing -- he's a third	06:28:59
19	grader doing much higher work than his brother is,	06:29:01
20	he's in fourth grade.	06:29:04
21	So I see a continued disbalance about how	06:29:06
22	I'm supposed to help my children to grow up in	06:29:11
23	Chicago where I grew up from and went to Chicago	06:29:15
24	Public School to understand that they have the same	06:29:17

1 level of education that everybody else that have it 06:29:20
2 that's not in Chicago. 06:29:23

3 So me, as a parent, I'm trying to see how 06:29:23
4 to weigh my options because we not the only poverty 06:29:26
5 that's in the country as Illinois because we have 06:29:30
6 other states that's got poverty, too, and they have 06:29:33
7 a better school system. They have their kids get 06:29:36
8 out of there. So it makes parents want to go to 06:29:40
9 places -- like I said, you can't leave poverty from 06:29:46
10 poverty if you still have the same income. That's 06:29:48
11 not going to change. 06:29:50

12 I do want to change the system as far as 06:29:51

20 Chicago born. 06:30:13

21 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Mr. Ford? 06:30:13

22 MR. FORD: Been here 39 years, and I want my 06:30:15
23 kids to be here, too. So, hopefully, Chicago 06:30:16
24 Public Schools will get their act together and we 06:30:18

1	can all have a good education for these kids.	06:30:21
2	Thank you very much.	06:30:24
3	SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Mr. Ford. Thank	06:30:26
4	you for your comments.	06:30:27
5	Next speakers, Mr. President, will be	06:30:29

11	Joy Clendenning, CPS parent. I am speaking tonight	06:30:45

13	What an afternoon. So this amended budget	06:30:51
14	is just not acceptable. Once again, it tries to	06:30:57
15	balance the budget on the backs of those most	06:31:00
16	vulnerable, this time by penalizing low-income or	06:31:02
17	sometimes known as low wealth -- that might be a	06:31:06
18	better word -- schools, those whose nonstaff	06:31:08
19	spending is most dependent on federal Title I and	06:31:12
20	state SGSA funds.	06:31:16
21	We believe it's time to make sacrifices in	06:31:19
22	Central Office departments and contracts, not with	06:31:22
23	basic classroom supplies and after-school programs	06:31:25
24	and not in a way that potentially violates,	06:31:28

1 supplement not supplant. 06:31:31

2 Forgive me while I shovel through papers. 06:31:34

3 We have a handout we'll give to you with a list of 06:31:37

4 some departments and also contracts that you can 06:31:39

5 peruse. Some examples: Professional services 06:31:42

6 contractors with political connections like 06:31:46

7 Analytic Innovations, or those with hourly charges 06:31:49

8 as high as \$580 an hour. We think you should give 06:31:53

9 these contracts more than a second look when 06:31:58

10 schools are having to cut low paid hourly staff who 06:32:02

11 care for our kids during recess and after-school 06:32:05

12 programs. 06:32:07

13 In August, you approved a contract for 06:32:09

14 \$12 million in ed tech to support the MTSS system 06:32:11

15 which is a really costly way to push what we 06:32:16

16 believe is a questionable policy. And, again, 06:32:19

17 we'll give you this list. 06:32:22

18 We also signed on to the letter about the 06:32:24

19 Noble Charter School expansion for seats at that 06:32:26

20 one campus. We're opposed to that. We also know 06:32:30

21 CPS put out another RFP for charters which is not 06:32:33

22 required by law, and so that's money being spent to 06:32:36

23 put out an RFP that you can spend elsewhere. 06:32:41

24 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Clendenning? 06:32:46

1 MS. CLENDENNING: I'll finish up right now. 06:32:47
2 So we are frankly a little confused 06:32:49
3 because we've been hearing about people are having 06:32:50
4 to shift money around after getting the news last 06:32:53

7 we would like to know, have the Board Members been 06:33:00
8 briefed on the amended budget? What information is 06:33:02

11 because the new slide this evening -- 06:33:11
12 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you. 06:33:13
13 MS. CLENDENNING: -- didn't really help. For 06:33:14
14 schools that don't have any money -- 06:33:15
15 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Ms. Clendenning. 06:33:17
16 MS. CLENDENNING: -- they're having to shift 06:33:19
17 things. So we really need some answers. Thanks 06:33:20
18 very much. 06:33:22
19 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you. Our next 06:33:23
20 speaker, please. 06:33:24
21 MS. BURCHJOLLA: Hello, Mr. Clark. Nice to see 06:33:28
22 you again. I'm Barbara Burchjolla, citizen, and I 06:33:30
23 want to state for the record that I love 06:33:36
24 Rahm Emanuel, but this is not about personalities. 06:33:37

1	This is about principles and practices in the CPS	06:33:42
2	school system.	06:33:46
3	I'm happy to hear about the charter	06:33:47
4	schools because actually that's where Rahm and I	06:33:49
5	cross swords. I believe that the money that is	06:33:52
6	used for the charter schools can be better spent on	06:33:55
7	the public school system. I don't know what the	06:33:58
8	budget is. I haven't looked at it, but I have done	06:34:01
9	a lot of research as far as what the charter	06:34:05
10	schools do.	06:34:08
11	I can tell you about the Stanford study,	06:34:11
12	2009 and 2011, and they say, and I'm paraphrasing,	06:34:14
13	that charter schools are no better than and	06:34:19
14	oftentimes worse than what they characterize as	06:34:21

16	So this is not about personalities. This	06:34:25
17	is about practices, and I believe that the citizens	06:34:28

2 Jessica Espinosa, and I'm a parent from Mather High 06:35:00
3 School. I also have Durkin Park parents with me. 06:35:03
4 Our school budget affected our school in 06:35:10
5 security overtime. Security overtime is needed as 06:35:14
6 we need and have to -- we lost two security this 06:35:17
7 year. We need security overtime to hire security 06:35:20
8 for before and after-school programs since we are 06:35:24
9 short-staffed already for the safety of all of our 06:35:28
10 students and to monitor students on our 06:35:35
11 after-school detention. 06:35:38
12 Detention serve as a way to make sure the 06:35:40
13 students are not tardy to school and get to class 06:35:43
14 on time. It has a major impact on the entire 06:35:45
15 education program and safety for our children. 06:35:48
16 As a parent, I only want to know that my 06:35:51
17 child is getting the education he needs and also 06:35:54
18 know that he's safe in school. I think that every 06:35:58
19 parent want their children's safety and also their 06:36:02
20 first priority is their education. 06:36:07
21 By the Governor cutting our fundings, not 06:36:10
22 only it's going to hurt our children's safety, but 06:36:13
23 also their education. Thank you. 06:36:16
24 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Ms. Espinosa. 06:36:18

1 Our next speaker, please, Patricia Clark. 06:36:20

2 MS. CLARK: Actually it's Erica Clark. 06:36:22

3 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you for clarifying, 06:36:24

4 Ms. Clark. 06:36:26

5 MS. CLARK: I'm with Parents for Teachers. 06:36:27

6 Thank you. 06:36:28

7 I'm going to echo some of the things that 06:36:29

8 Ms. Lewis said although, Karen, I'm going to be a 06:36:31

9 lot nicer than she was -- she was a lot nicer than 06:36:33

10 I'm going to be. 06:36:36

11 You are not going to find any love lost 06:36:37

12 here among any of us for Governor Rauner. His 06:36:39

13 actions have been and continue to be despicable, 06:36:42

14 but your actions are equally despicable. You 06:36:45

15 continue to cut schools and programs. Your cuts 06:36:48

16 harm the most vulnerable and the most in need 06:36:53

17 students. And your attacks on special ed are 06:36:57

18 shameful. What kind of people deprives special 06:37:01

19 needs students of their teachers and of the 06:37:05

20 services they need? Those students need stability 06:37:08

21 and safety and security, not the continued chaos 06:37:11

22 you've been inflicting on them. 06:37:14

23 So, you know, we all as you know would 06:37:16

24 like to see the elected school board elected. We 06:37:20

1 would like to see the school board elected and you 06:37:22
2 guys out of a job. But the Mayor continues to 06:37:26
3 insist that he wants to run the schools. So if he 06:37:30
4 wants to run the schools, he wants that 06:37:33
5 responsibility, he needs to stand up and take 06:37:35
6 accountability for what's going on. The buck has 06:37:39
7 to stop at City Hall. This blame game is getting 06:37:42
8 us nowhere. You're asking us to just kind of like 06:37:47
9 cross our fingers and hold our breath and hope that 06:37:50
10 the Governor comes through with some money. 06:37:53
11 And you said the balance -- the budget was 06:37:55
12 balanced before the veto. This budget was never 06:37:57
13 balanced. That was funny money all along. Who do 06:38:00
14 you think you're fooling? It's time for you guys 06:38:03
15 to step up and do your job. We come here meeting 06:38:06
16 after meeting giving you solutions on ways to cut 06:38:10
17 that don't harm students, like Joy just said. We 06:38:13
18 give you funding options, progressive revenue 06:38:16
19 sources that you could demand that the Mayor 06:38:19
20 implement. 06:38:22
21 Mr. Clark, we were here in August. We 06:38:22
22 talked to you specifically. We asked you to 06:38:24
23 support the TIF ordinance and you refused. You all 06:38:27
24 sat there with blank looks -- 06:38:30

1 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Clark? 06:38:31
2 MS. CLARK: -- and denied our requests. 06:38:32
3 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Clark? 06:38:34
4 MS. CLARK: It's not our job to tell you how to 06:38:35
5 fund the schools. But this blame game has got to 06:38:37
6 stop. The buck stops with the Mayor, and he has to 06:38:40
7 take responsibility for fixing this problem. 06:38:42
8 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Ms. Clark. 06:38:45
9 Our next speaker, Mr. President, will be 06:38:46
10 Speaker Number 9, Katherine Osgood followed by 06:38:48
11 Speaker Number 10, Marrice Griffin Conerson 06:38:51
12 followed by Speaker Number 11, Nathan Petithomme, 06:38:56
13 and Speaker Number 12, Jasmine Curtis. 06:38:59
14 Katherine Osgood, please. 06:39:05
15 MS. OSGOOD: Hi. It's Osgood actually. 06:39:05
16 Good evening, everyone. I'm a special 06:39:11
17 education teacher. I teach at Langston Hughes 06:39:15
18 Elementary on the far south side of Roseland. I 06:39:17
19 just want to say real quick, it would be helpful to 06:39:19
20 have some more of these meetings in different 06:39:21
21 locations around the city. My community, school 06:39:22
22 community had a hard time coming up here. They 06:39:26
23 weren't able to be here even though they wanted to 06:39:28
24 speak. 06:39:30

1 Today, I have actually spoken to the Board 06:39:31
2 before about the trauma, about the chaos that my 06:39:33
3 special education students are going through as a 06:39:37
4 result of these budget cuts. Today, instead of 06:39:39
5 continuing to tell those stories, you guys know 06:39:42
6 those stories about the trauma, about the -- just 06:39:44
7 the constant disruptions to schedules, we're 06:39:50
8 actually going to ask you guys if you would commit 06:39:52
9 to standing with us to help protect our special 06:39:56
10 education students. 06:40:01
11 Now in special education, we often use 06:40:02
12 little charts like this with our kids, especially 06:40:04
13 our kids with autism. It's called a first VIN 06:40:08
14 chart. I'm asking every member of the Board to go 06:40:12
15 and use your own networks. You all are appointed 06:40:13
16 by Rahm Emanuel. This means you know him. He's a 06:40:16
17 friends of yours. I need you to go to him and 06:40:19
18 explain to him this chart. 06:40:21
19 First, you need to fund your schools. 06:40:24
20 Then you can go do your river walk, your 06:40:29
21 high-rises, your TIF projects, your whatever it is 06:40:34
22 you need to do. But go tell him we need this done 06:40:39
23 first. And, first of all, we need to protect our 06:40:42
24 most vulnerable which includes our special 06:40:46

1 education students. 06:40:48

2 Today, we're asking the Board Members, and 06:40:49

3 this includes our CEO, this includes all the 06:40:51

4 members that are on -- who are leaders in CPS, 06:40:55

5 we're asking you today to sign a pledge. The 06:40:58

6 pledge reads: I pledge to CPS students with 06:41:01

7 disabilities, February 13th. I, your name, as a 06:41:06

8 member of the Chicago Board of Education pledge 06:41:10

9 that I will do everything in my power to ensure 06:41:12

10 that special education programs are fully funded -- 06:41:15

11 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Osgood. 06:41:18

12 MS. OSGOOD: -- and distinct from general 06:41:19

13 education, uncommingled funds to ensure all 06:41:21

14 students' needs are met. Additionally, I promise 06:41:23

15 that the Board will practice fiscal responsibility 06:41:25

16 and advocate for local progressive revenue. 06:41:28

17 We are asking that you sign this, that you 06:41:31

18 say -- so I'm going to ask Mr. Clark, 06:41:33

19 President Clark, would you please sign this pledge 06:41:36

20 right now that says that you will -- that you will 06:41:39

21 advocate for special education students, that you 06:41:42

22 will go on all of the talk shows and the news 06:41:45

23 programs in our city, that you will go to your 06:41:47

24 networks of millionaires and the corporate elite 06:41:49

1 that are in our city? I know that you guys have 06:41:52
2 these connections. Will you go to them and push 06:41:54
3 for progressive revenue? Will you push to release 06:41:56
4 the TIF funds that still exist, have not been 06:41:59
5 released yet? Will you go and -- will you -- 06:42:01
6 PRESIDENT CLARK: You need to let me answer 06:42:05
7 them so you can wrap up so other people can speak. 06:42:07
8 MS. OSGOOD: We have our Sharpie here.
9 PRESIDENT CLARK: The short answer to your 06:42:10
10 question is that you don't know, although you think 06:42:11
11 you do, you don't know what this Board does. You 06:42:15
12 don't. You come here with very, very 06:42:18
13 predetermined, preconceived -- 06:42:23
14 MS. OSGOOD: I'm just speaking for my special 06:42:25
15 education students. 06:42:27
16 PRESIDENT CLARK: Let me speak. Let me speak. 06:42:28
17 I'm addressing that precise issue. You come here 06:42:31
18 with a pledge, the ramifications of which I don't 06:42:34
19 really know what it means. No one signs anything 06:42:38
20 without thoroughly understanding it, at least they 06:42:40
21 shouldn't. 06:42:43
22 But at the end of the day, we have some 06:42:44
23 things in common. I do believe you care. I think 06:42:45
24 you care deeply. You don't respect other people's 06:42:49

1 opinions, but you shared yours, and some of what 06:42:52
2 you said I think deserves more thought. 06:42:56

3 I know that this question comes up 06:43:00
4 constantly from Board Members to the leadership on 06:43:02
5 special ed and special ed funding, and we've gotten 06:43:05
6 very complete, thorough answers. You don't agree 06:43:09
7 with those answers. And I respect that. 06:43:11

8 MS. OSGOOD: Your answers are harming my 06:43:13
9 children. I just want a pledge that you're going 06:43:15
10 to make that stop. That's all I am asking. 06:43:19
11 whatever you have to do, whatever is in your power 06:43:21
12 to do, and this includes the entire Board, I know, 06:43:23
13 you know, you guys can get on these news shows. 06:43:27
14 You can be out there writing op-eds. You can be on 06:43:29
15 board with all of us that are fighting for these 06:43:30
16 things and make a united front and actually go 06:43:32
17 after the people that have money in our city. 06:43:36

18 Our city is so rich. You just have to 06:43:38
19 come downtown and you see the money. I don't 06:43:41
20 understand why we just -- I'm in a high poverty 06:43:42
21 school in an African-American community and we just 06:43:46
22 got another round of budget cuts. This is our 06:43:48
23 seventh, eighth round. 06:43:51

24 PRESIDENT CLARK: I have to let other people 06:43:53

1 speak. Thank you very much. 06:43:55
2 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you for your 06:43:55
3 comments. 06:43:56
4 MS. OSGOOD: So the answer was no. 06:43:58
5 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Griffin? Please state 06:43:59
6 your name. 06:44:09
7 MS. CONVERSON: Marrice Conerson. 06:44:10
8 Doolittle, 2,828, 40,978 cut. Drake, 06:44:13
9 4,124, 51,911 cut. Dunbar High School, 7,496, 06:44:22
10 104,676 cut. 06:44:29
11 Good evening. It's my pleasure to talk to 06:44:31
12 you, but not under these circumstances. This a 06:44:35
13 crisis. We are in crisis. Now what are we going 06:44:39
14 do about it? These are our children. It's not 06:44:44
15 your children. It's not somebody else's child. 06:44:47
16 It's all our children. These are our children 06:44:50
17 we're talking about. Our education for our 06:44:53
18 children in crisis. 06:44:56
19 Pre-schoolers start school, some of them 06:44:57
20 are reading, some of them are not. By this time, 06:45:00
21 some of them may be getting together and starting 06:45:04
22 to read. Some of them have not even -- when they 06:45:06
23 start have not been in an educational system at 06:45:09
24 all. So now they may just be starting. But now 06:45:12

1 you're cutting. So where are children are? what 06:45:16
2 is going to happen to our children? 06:45:20
3 This -- I understand the whole thing about 06:45:22
4 balancing budgets. All of us have to have balanced 06:45:26
5 budgets. But do we have to balance them for the 06:45:29
6 education of our children? Everybody knows that 06:45:33
7 Chicago Public Schools kids cannot read. So what 06:45:35
8 does this mean? More children not reading? More 06:45:40
9 children not doing math? More children not doing 06:45:44
10 science? Does that mean we have no engineers 06:45:47
11 anymore? What does it mean? 06:45:50
12 I know you care. I know you care, but I 06:45:53
13 also know that you have alliances. But cut all the 06:45:57
14 alliances at this time. The alliance always should 06:46:03
15 be to our children. Only to our children. And so 06:46:06
16 what we should do, we should stop now, stop right 06:46:10
17 now with this budget cut -- 06:46:14
18 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Conerson? 06:46:16
19 MS. CONERSON: -- and figure out how we can 06:46:17
20 join together and make this work for our children. 06:46:19
21 Thank you. 06:46:23
22 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you for your 06:46:24
23 comments. Our next speaker, please. 06:46:25
24 PRESIDENT CLARK: Dr. Jackson, no one knows the 06:46:27

1 academic achievements of CPS better than you and 06:46:30
2 Forrest. Do you care to make any response 06:46:34
3 regarding the academics of CPS and the statement 06:46:37
4 that our kids cannot read? 06:46:40
5 CEEdO JACKSON: well, I think it's been noted 06:46:42
6 that our kids have made significant gains over the 06:46:43
7 past five to ten years, and I also know that 06:46:45
8 Reverend Conerson is well aware of that as an 06:46:49
9 active member of the Bronzeville CAC. I think, you 06:46:52
10 know, making maybe just more of a political 06:46:56
11 statement around the fact that our kids do need -- 06:46:58
12 they do need great schools in order to continue 06:47:01
13 along that trajectory, but nobody would doubt that 06:47:04
14 we've made progress over time. 06:47:05
15 So I think it was more of a broad 06:47:07
16 statement -- and I don't want to speak for her -- 06:47:08
17 just more of a broad statement about what's at 06:47:10
18 stake, and I don't disagree that a lot is at stake. 06:47:12
19 PRESIDENT CLARK: Thank you, Dr. Jackson. 06:47:16
20 Continue. 06:47:17
21 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Mr. President. 06:47:18
22 I'll continue. The next speaker, please, is 06:47:19
23 Nathan Petithomme followed by Speaker Number 12, 06:47:21
24 Jasmine Curtis. We then have Speaker 13, 06:47:25

1	Catherine Henchek, Speaker 14, Bess Kuchenbecker.	06:47:28
2	Last call for Nathan Petithomme.	06:47:33
3	Moving on to the next speaker, last call	06:47:35
4	for Jasmine Curtis.	06:47:37
5	Last call for Catherine Henchek. Please	06:47:39
6	state your name.	06:47:44
7	MS. HENCHEK: Catherine Henchek. Hello. As I	06:47:44
8	said, I'm Catherine Henchek, and I'm here as a	06:47:51
9	member of Parents for Teachers and a parent of a	06:47:53
10	special needs child in CPS.	06:47:56
11	I have been here before and, frankly, I'm	06:47:57
12	kind of disgusted we're having the same	06:48:02
13	conversation over and over again. When we passed	06:48:02
14	this budget which relied on state funding, I think	06:48:06
15	everybody outside the Board knew that wasn't going	06:48:09
16	to come through, and then we're just blaming the	06:48:11
17	Governor for it. I mean, we all knew he wasn't	06:48:14
18	going to pay up.	06:48:17
19	So why aren't we doing anything about this	06:48:18
20	as a city? We've been pushing for the TIF	06:48:21
21	ordinance, but nothing has happened. There's other	06:48:23
22	progressive revenue sources that people have been	06:48:27
23	talking about, the corporate head tax,	06:48:30
24	millionaire's tax, and nothing is happening.	06:48:32

1 I don't really understand why the Board 06:48:35
2 isn't out pushing for these things. We just got to 06:48:38
3 stop blaming the Governor and actually find some 06:48:41
4 money in the city. We can't balance the budget on 06:48:43
5 the backs of special needs children. 06:48:46
6 As I said, I have got a special needs 06:48:48
7 child and, you know, he's 14. He's only just 06:48:50
8 started to learn to read; and, to be honest, I 06:48:55
9 never thought he would be able to read, and I'm 06:48:57
10 really excited by this. And he couldn't have done 06:48:59
11 it if he didn't have all the aides, all the 06:49:02
12 supports, all the therapists, the speech 06:49:05
13 therapists, all these people to help. And the kids 06:49:07
14 coming up now, what's happening? Their money is 06:49:11
15 being cut. And children like this need that help. 06:49:14
16 They need one-on-one. They need a small classroom. 06:49:17
17 And we cannot balance the budget on their backs. 06:49:21
18 So don't take the future away from our 06:49:26
19 special needs children. I'm really asking you to 06:49:27
20 do the right thing, try and find money within this 06:49:30
21 city. We know there is money here. Quit blaming 06:49:34
22 the Governor. Nothing is going to happen with 06:49:37
23 Springfield. Look for the money here. And, you 06:49:39
24 know, don't penalize our children, especially our 06:49:41

1 special needs children who need all the help they 06:49:44
2 can get. Thank you. 06:49:46

3 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Ms. Henchek. 06:49:47
4 Our next speaker, please. 06:49:49

5 MS. KUCHENBECKER: Hello. My name is 06:49:52
6 Bess Kuchenbecker. I am a charter teacher at the 06:49:56
7 UNO Charter School Network in Archer Heights. I am 06:49:59
8 the special education teacher for middle school as 06:50:03
9 well as the case manager. 06:50:05

10 I want to say that everything that 06:50:07
11 Catherine just said is all the words that I would 06:50:09
12 like to say as well as a few others. Some of the 06:50:11
13 things that we need are we need special education 06:50:14
14 teachers, because if we're not there to teach those 06:50:17
15 children, then they don't get taught. Because the 06:50:20
16 fact is that they need these services and they're 06:50:23
17 not getting them. They're not getting them in CPS 06:50:26
18 schools and they're not getting them in the charter 06:50:29
19 schools either which you also fund. 06:50:31

20 We have been cut across the city, whether 06:50:34
21 we work in a charter school or we work in one of 06:50:37
22 the district schools. We are all in the same boat. 06:50:39
23 We have the same children. My children live in 06:50:43
24 Archer Heights, and they can't get their special 06:50:46

1 education services because we don't have the 06:50:48
2 funding. We can't get the materials that they 06:50:51
3 need, that are specialized. We have kids who need 06:50:54
4 special scissors, who need special paper, who need 06:50:56

6 to pay for that, especially with this latest freeze 06:51:03
7 because that's where this freeze is going to hit 06:51:06
8 us. It's going to hit us in the supplies that 06:51:08
9 those kids can't have unless we got the money to 06:51:11
10 pay for it. 06:51:13
11 We need to fully fund our special 06:51:14
12 education programs. We need to fully fund our 06:51:16
13 schools. We have such immense violence in the city 06:51:18
14 because children are uneducated, because children 06:51:22
15 don't have what they need. They don't have 06:51:24
16 after-school programs. They don't have the 06:51:26
17 supports that they need in place to make the good 06:51:28
18 decisions. So they are failing to make those good 06:51:31
19 decisions. And what does that end in? It ends in 06:51:34
20 the extreme violence that this city sees. 06:51:37
21 So fund after-school programs. Fund our 06:51:39
22 kids' schools equally, including the south side 06:51:42
23 that's always shafted. Please, show how much you 06:51:45
24 care about these kids and provide them with the 06:51:49

1	funding that they need regardless of where they are	06:51:51
2	located, regardless if they are a charter school or	06:51:54
3	a regular public school. Thank you.	06:51:57

24	special education teachers, my daughter is where	06:52:56

1 she is. She is a 15-year-old who has a third grade 06:52:59
2 reading level, but because of those teachers right 06:53:04

4 why are we taking their money? It's their 06:53:11
5 money. It's not Rahm's money. It's not Rauner's 06:53:14
6 money. It's our special education kids' money. 06:53:18
7 Let's start taxing the million dollar people, not 06:53:21
8 our students. 06:53:24
9 why do our kids have to worry about if 06:53:27
10 their teachers are going to come back or not or if 06:53:29
11 their teacher is working for free or not? These 06:53:32
12 teachers care about these children that you see in 06:53:34

21 A VOICE: She's using the rest of her time. 06:54:00
22 SECRETARY BELTRAN: I'm sorry, did she register 06:54:03
23 to speak? What's her name? She didn't register to 06:54:04
24 speak. Ms. Chambers? 06:54:08

1 MS. CHAMBERS: Not letting students speak. 06:54:09
2 Typical Board. 06:54:11
3 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Please state your name. 06:54:13
4 MS. CHAMBERS: Sarah Chambers, Saucedo Academy. 06:54:14
5 Good morning, unelected school board. I'm here to 06:54:17
6 ask where is Rahm Emanuel because we all know he 06:54:20
7 controls everything that goes on here? Everyone 06:54:23
8 knows that every single budget decision that is 06:54:25
9 made here, he is choosing. Rahm Emanuel is 06:54:28
10 choosing, and he is choosing not to fund special 06:54:32
11 education. He is choosing to make cuts to special 06:54:35
12 education. 06:54:38
13 And every time that Rahm Emanuel gives 06:54:39
14 millions of dollars in TIF money to condos 06:54:41
15 downtown, like River Pointe Plaza got 25 million, 06:54:44
16 or every time he's choosing his rich banker 06:54:48
17 buddies, he's choosing them over my students with 06:54:51
18 disabilities. Shame. Shame on Rahm Emanuel. And 06:54:53
19 every time Rahm refuses to renegotiate toxic swaps, 06:54:57
20 he's choosing his banker buddies over my students 06:55:01
21 with disabilities. 06:55:04
22 Rahm, you blame Rauner, right? We all 06:55:07
23 know. Rahm is on the news. You all are on the 06:55:09
24 news blaming Rauner every day. This is Rahm's 06:55:12

1 fault. This is your city. If you did not want to 06:55:15
2 run Chicago Public Schools, then give it to us. 06:55:17
3 Give us an elected school board. Give us an 06:55:20
4 elected school board. 06:55:22
5 And Rahm Emanuel is here blaming 06:55:26
6 Republicans, but here he is, destroying special 06:55:28
7 education. There are at least 20 speakers on this 06:55:32
8 list speaking on special education. The past few 06:55:35
9 months, the Board of Ed, you've had the same. 06:55:38
10 Rahm Emanuel is blaming Republicans? He's doing 06:55:40
11 the same thing DeVos is about to do. DeVos is 06:55:43
12 about to destroy special education. Here, 06:55:47
13 Rahm Emanuel is doing it in his own city. 06:55:50
14 All right. So what does this actually 06:55:52
15 look like in our schools? At Saucedo last 06:55:53
16 Wednesday, people from downtown CPS came into our 06:55:57
17 schools to change all the special education 06:55:59
18 schedules. Written on the schedules, it said that 06:56:01
19 they're cutting minutes. It said too many minutes. 06:56:04
20 Do a revision. Too many minutes. Cut from 600 06:56:06
21 minutes to 300. I listed all the kids. They're 06:56:09
22 cutting 28 students' minutes, reducing the minutes. 06:56:11
23 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Chambers. 06:56:15
24 MS. CHAMBERS: They're saying they're trying to 06:56:16

1 make minutes meet. They're not trying to make 06:56:18
2 minutes meet. They're trying to cut special 06:56:19
3 education because you all think it's too expensive. 06:56:21
4 Shame on you. Look at these kids in the 06:56:24
5 face. Look at these kids in the face because you 06:56:26
6 are deciding not to fund their education, not to 06:56:28
7 fund special education -- 06:56:31
8 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Chambers? 06:56:32
9 MS. CHAMBERS: -- and, instead, to fund bankers 06:56:33
10 and billionaires. Shame. 06:56:34
11 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you. Our next 06:56:36
12 speaker, please, Natasha Carlsen. Last call. 06:56:38
13 MS. CARLSEN: I'm here. I am short. Sorry. 06:56:45
14 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Carlsen? 06:56:53
15 MS. CARLSEN: I was just checking for my pledge 06:56:54
16 that I had made just in case any of your 06:56:56
17 accommodations were that you needed a larger print, 06:56:58
18 that was all. 06:57:01
19 After two prior budget drafts, both 06:57:02
20 hearings that I attended as a special education 06:57:05
21 teacher and a system that is forced me to be an 06:57:07
22 advocate, you still fail to protect the well-being 06:57:11
23 and basic safety. 06:57:14
24 Mr. Clark, you stated that you expect the 06:57:16

1 state will fulfill its promise, but all of us told 06:57:18
2 you that was not unthinkable, and it was exactly 06:57:22
3 what we thought would occur. And especially since, 06:57:25
4 Mr. Clark, you just said, I don't know what you do 06:57:28
5 or we don't know what you do or you are stating 06:57:30
6 that we don't respect your opinions. I'm sorry, 06:57:34
7 but -- I'm not sorry. I don't respect your opinion 06:57:36
8 when it's shown through your vote and voice that 06:57:40
9 you want us to continue to do more with less when 06:57:43
10 there's nothing left to cut. You cannot cut your 06:57:46
11 way to good schools on the backs of my children, 06:57:49
12 all children, and all teachers. 06:57:52

13 when you brag about that you fight for 06:57:54
14 revenue, but, in fact, in special education in 06:57:57
15 Illinois, that it is 95 percent less than what 06:58:01
16 other school districts in the state give. 06:58:04

17 Also, the professional development for 06:58:07
18 principals for quarter two, something us teachers 06:58:09
19 know nothing about because this budget chooses to 06:58:12
20 furlough us for, you chose to have your white paper 06:58:14
21 from the Oodles department which it selectively 06:58:18
22 cited research that was meant to deceive rather 06:58:22
23 than to illuminate which is in line with practice 06:58:24
24 of the budget that lacks accountability, 06:58:27

1	transparency or any sense.	06:58:30
2	You cited in the white paper Boston which	06:58:32
3	Boston, Tampa, and St. Paul all have higher	06:58:35
4	achievement for our special ed students because	06:58:37
5	they invest in our special education students.	06:58:40
6	Boston dramatically increased spending from 2006	06:58:42
7	which was around 11,000 to 2015 which was more than	06:58:46
8	16,000. Tampa has increased their spending by	06:58:50
9	19 percent since 2010. And even St. Paul, where	06:58:54
10	our Deputy Chief Liz Keenan is from, had increased	06:58:57
11	per pupil funding up to 18,167.	06:59:02
12	SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Carlsen?	06:59:05
13	MS. CARLSEN: Thank you for a budget that does	06:59:05
14	not meet the needs of my students. If you are	06:59:07
15	serious about meeting the needs and if you are	06:59:09
16	serious about your opinion and you are serious	06:59:11
17	about what you do as a Board, an unelected school	06:59:13
18	board at that --	06:59:17
19	SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Ms. Carlsen.	06:59:17
20	MS. CARLSEN: -- you will fight for progressive	06:59:18
21	revenue. You will give our students the budget --	06:59:20
22	SECRETARY BELTRAN: Our next speaker, please,	06:59:21
23	Omar Santiago Diaz.	06:59:23
24	MR. DIAZ: Ladies and gentlemen, how are you	06:59:27

1 doing? I'm a parent. This is my son here. He got 06:59:30
2 special ed needs. 06:59:33
3 To be honest with you, these are old 06:59:36
4 tactics. You guys keep going back and forth about 06:59:40
5 budget, this and that. We pay the highest taxes in 06:59:42
6 the whole country. You're building condos, billion 06:59:45
7 dollar schools, Emanuel that's building by Hyde 06:59:49
8 Park, and kids are going ten to five miles away 06:59:55
9 from their home and they have to go through gangs 06:59:58
10 that is not even in the neighborhood. 07:00:03
11 You got kids that are deaf. You got kids 07:00:06
12 that are handicapped. You got kids that are blind. 07:00:09
13 Maybe none of you guys got kids like that, but once 07:00:13
14 in a while, if you live in your neighborhood, you 07:00:15
15 might see a parent with their kids. How hard it is 07:00:18
16 to take that child to a store, help them go into 07:00:20
17 the washroom or help that blind child trying to 07:00:24
18 come into the car, get out of the car without 07:00:28
19 getting hit. 07:00:30
20 These programs help these kids. I know in 07:00:32
21 the past it's been going up and down with the 07:00:36
22 budget, but you got to look at the bright side. 07:00:39
23 Yes, the reading scores is going up slowly. It's 07:00:41
24 moving up. These teachers are spending 12 hours a 07:00:44

1 day even when they're at home doing paperwork, 07:00:47
2 correcting kids, putting money out of their pocket 07:00:51
3 to give into the kids. 07:00:53
4 As a parent, I contribute. Some parents, 07:00:56
5 they don't contribute, but they volunteer to help 07:00:59
6 the teachers out. It's not about -- it's about 07:01:01
7 protecting that child, even if this child is not 07:01:06
8 mine, white, black, Asian, Hispanic, Muslim, 07:01:09
9 Indonesian. It all matters because we want to get 07:01:13
10 the same education, equality. 07:01:16
11 Emanuel, you guys pass laws to make sure 07:01:21
12 that child on the first day of the school so you 07:01:24
13 guys can get the funds. If you do, you don't, you 07:01:27
14 can correct me, but -- 07:01:30
15 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Mr. Diaz? 07:01:32
16 MR. DIAZ: -- when the kids get there the first 07:01:33
17 day of school, what happens? Nothing. It's the 07:01:35
18 same ol' story. It's like playing Monopoly. Once 07:01:38
19 you go across Boardwalk, oh, well, we're sorry, we 07:01:42
20 don't got money, but we are doing all this 07:01:45
21 construction around the city. 07:01:47
22 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Mr. Diaz, thank you for 07:01:48
23 your comments. 07:01:50
24 MR. DIAZ: Thank you. 07:01:50

1 SECRETARY BELTRAN: I'll continue, 07:01:51
2 Mr. President, with the next speakers and we'll 07:01:52
3 have Speaker Number 19, please, Misael Camarillo 07:01:55
4 followed by Speaker Number 20, America Olmedo, and 07:02:00
5 then speaker Number 21, Olga Contreras. 07:02:04
6 MR. CAMARILLO: Good evening, everybody. My 07:02:07
7 name is Misael Camarillo. I'm also a parent of a 07:02:09
8 kid that's in seventh grade. He's been getting 07:02:13
9 special ed since probably about two years ago, and 07:02:16
10 he needed that education really bad because, before 07:02:20
11 that, his grades were really low, below average; 07:02:24
12 and, right now, I can gladly say he's between As 07:02:29
13 and Bs, and he couldn't have done that without 07:02:34
14 special education and the teachers that are here 07:02:38
15 helping them every day. This is my son. 07:02:41
16 I think if you guys take money from -- 07:02:48
17 that is destined for his education, you pretty much 07:02:51
18 are hurting his future because I want him to go to 07:02:56
19 college, and I want him to develop his skills; but 07:02:59
20 since he was born premature, he had learning issues 07:03:08
21 from the beginning. So that's why he needs that 07:03:13
22 special education. 07:03:15
23 If you guys cut that right now, he's going 07:03:18
24 to start having problems or learning issues 07:03:22

1 probably starting high school. So what's going to 07:03:26
2 happen after that? He probably won't be able to go 07:03:30
3 to college because he couldn't get enough education 07:03:33
4 from the beginning. And that's a hurtful thing for 07:03:37
5 my son. 07:03:42
6 Mr. Clark, what do you think about that, 07:03:46
7 sir? 07:03:48
8 PRESIDENT CLARK: I think you're a wonderful 07:03:49
9 parent and you delivered a strong, compelling 07:03:51
10 message. 07:03:53
11 MR. CAMARILLO: Thank you, sir. 07:03:55
12 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Mr. Camarillo. 07:03:56
13 Our next speaker, please, America Olmedo. 07:03:58
14 MS. OLMEDO: Good evening. My name is 07:04:04
15 America Olmedo. I've been a CPS student, 07:04:11
16 elementary school, high school. I was the first 07:04:16
17 one to graduate college from my family. I have 07:04:19
18 four children. Two are now in college and two are 07:04:22
19 in elementary school. 07:04:24
20 So I'm here to talk about -- because I 07:04:26
21 know you already heard about all the special ed 07:04:28
22 cuts, but besides that, I'm here to talk about the 07:04:30
23 wonderful job Durkin Park Elementary is doing with 07:04:34
24 my children, the principal, the assistant 07:04:37

1 principal, but especially the special ed teachers. 07:04:40
2 I heard that Durkin Park was cut \$68,622, 07:04:45
3 and that's a little upsetting not only as a parent 07:04:51
4 but as a resident because I pay property taxes and 07:04:54
5 my property taxes are not decreasing. Actually 07:04:59
6 they have been increasing for the last five years, 07:05:02
7 and I don't mind because I know part of that is for 07:05:05
8 my children, for the education, for the libraries. 07:05:08
9 I definitely don't mind, right. 07:05:12
10 The other second thing is, as you heard it 07:05:16
11 already, it's on the price of whose back? The most 07:05:18
12 vulnerable. My youngest son, he has an IEP. He's 07:05:25
13 been in a special program for the last two years, 07:05:27
14 and for the first time he does not hate going to 07:05:30
15 school. He loves to read. He comes to me and 07:05:34
16 says, mom, help me with my homework because this is 07:05:38
17 something he can do. Okay. 07:05:41
18 So if these cuts are going to continue, I 07:05:45
19 haven't heard about Durkin Park. I was a little 07:05:48
20 surprised earlier that they have a safety issue. 07:05:50
21 I'm going to get my husband to go and volunteer 07:05:53
22 during the day because that's not right. And I 07:05:55
23 hope they don't start cutting the special ed 07:05:57
24 programs because that's where they're going to 07:05:59

1 start is what I hear. 07:06:01
2 I don't want him to lose that stamina that 07:06:03
3 he has grown. He's ten years old. And yes, he is 07:06:05
4 going to go to college because I am a determined 07:06:09
5 mom. 07:06:11
6 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. Olmedo, can you please 07:06:11
7 conclude? 07:06:12
8 MS. OLMEDO: I'm so sorry, I'm so sorry. Let's 07:06:13
9 listen to the other options for funding. Listen to 07:06:16
10 CTU. We got the millionaire's tax, the LaSalle 07:06:18
11 Street tax, the TIF surplus. We must put our 07:06:22
12 children first. 07:06:25
13 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Ms. Olmedo. 07:06:26
14 Our next speaker, please, Olga Contreras 07:06:28
15 followed by Speaker Number 23, Norine Gutekanst, 07:06:31
16 and Speaker 24, Julianna Ritzu. 07:06:35
17 MS. CONTRERAS: (Through interpreter) My name 07:06:39
18 is Olga Contreras. I'm here to speak about other 07:07:52
19 aspect of the budget, the cuts that are affecting 07:07:57
20 the cleaning of our schools and the health of our 07:08:01
21 students and staff. 07:08:05
22 Floors are dirty. The soap they are using 07:08:07
23 is diluted. It doesn't have foam. Please make 07:08:10
24 sure to hire more personnel to clean the schools so 07:08:15

1 we can have a healthy and respectful environment 07:08:20
2 for our communities. Cleaning is not negotiable 07:08:23
3 because it could be a health risk. We don't have 07:08:27
4 -- we don't want to see rats or roaches 07:08:31
5 infestations in the schools. So instead of going 07:08:36
6 to the news to tell our story, we invite you to 07:08:39
7 visit our schools in Little Village. Thank you. 07:08:43
8 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Ms. Contreras. 07:08:49
9 Our next speaker, please, Norine Gutekanst. 07:08:50
10 MS. GUTKANST: Hello, good evening. My name 07:08:56
11 is Norine Gutekanst. I'm here to ask what are you 07:08:58
12 and your political patron, Rahm, going to do to 07:09:02
13 fund our schools? Not the game of blaming Rauner, 07:09:06
14 but the work of finding revenue solutions. 07:09:10
15 And I'm going to give you some solutions, 07:09:14
16 proposals that you have heard many times before, 07:09:16
17 but I want to know when it is you're going to start 07:09:19
18 looking at them and when you're going to start 07:09:21
19 actually funding the schools instead of 07:09:24
20 perpetrating the cuts that everybody has been 07:09:27
21 talking about. 07:09:28
22 We -- I'm a member of Chicago Teachers 07:09:30
23 Union. We support reinstating the employer's 07:09:33
24 expense head tax. That could supply \$94 million 07:09:35

1 for our schools in one year. We're in favor of the 07:09:41
2 personal property lease transaction tax which could 07:09:45
3 provide \$35 million to help fund our schools. 07:09:49
4 There's potential TIF surplus money of up to 07:09:53
5 \$100 million. 07:09:57
6 So our City Council is actually controlled 07:09:58
7 by Democrats. I don't think there's a single 07:10:01
8 Republican in that City Council, right? There's no 07:10:03
9 partisan divide there. Every ward has multiple 07:10:05
10 schools. Every single one of these schools is 07:10:09
11 facing cuts. What are you going to do to work with 07:10:11
12 City Council to fund our schools? 07:10:14
13 There's also things that you can do in the 07:10:16
14 legislature in Springfield, but I don't see that 07:10:20
15 you or Rahm are doing any of this stuff. You could 07:10:21
16 be going after the TIF surplus funds. House Bill 07:10:25
17 3720, that would say that TIF surplus money should 07:10:32
18 actually go towards funding these dire special 07:10:36
19 education funds needs that we have in our school. 07:10:39
20 You could be supporting a millionaire's 07:10:41
21 tax. That would provide millions of dollars for 07:10:43
22 our schools. You could support the carried 07:10:45
23 interest tax which is a bill that's been introduced 07:10:48
24 by Senator Daniel Biss and Chris Welch. 07:10:52

1 So what I want to know is what are you 07:10:55
2 going to do to find funding for our schools? 07:10:58
3 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Ms. Gutekanst. 07:11:01
4 Thank you for your comments. 07:11:02
5 Our next speaker, Mr. President, is 07:11:04
6 Speaker Number 24, please, Juliana Ritzu followed 07:11:06
7 by Speaker 25, Sabah Hussain, and then we'll have 07:11:10
8 Speaker Number 27 -- I'm sorry, 26, Jesse Sharkey 07:11:13
9 followed by Speaker 27, Rosa Esquivel. 07:11:17
10 Julianna Ritzu? Last call. 07:11:21
11 Moving on to the next speaker, 07:11:24
12 Sabah Hussain? Last call. 07:11:25
13 We then have Jesse Sharkey, please. 07:11:29
14 MR. SHARKEY: Good evening, President Clark and 07:11:37
15 members of the Board. I'm Jesse Sharkey. I'm the 07:11:39
16 vice president of CTU. Good evening. 07:11:41
17 Rauner vetoed \$215 million. And, frankly, 07:11:46
18 I wasn't surprised. I doubt any of us in this room 07:11:50
19 were surprised by that. Look, I know he has 07:11:52
20 disdain for public school teachers in Chicago. He 07:11:58
21 called us illiterate. I know he has disdain for 07:11:59
22 the finances of this district. He personally 07:12:02
23 intervened in the bond market to drive up the cost 07:12:05
24 of our borrowing to the benefit of his friends in 07:12:07

1	the bond market. So I'm really not surprised by	07:12:12
2	that.	07:12:15
3	But Rauner's personal qualities are	07:12:16
4	somewhat beside the point. Rauner has a program	07:12:18
5	that's fundamentally anti public education. It's a	07:12:21
6	program of keeping taxes low so that the companies	07:12:25
7	and the wealthy can prosper in Illinois. And he	07:12:27
8	calls that being good for business and, yet, what	07:12:30
9	that means is freezes and cuts in public schools	07:12:33
10	despite the fact that those public schools are at	07:12:36
11	the heart of our neighborhoods and the heart of our	07:12:38
12	future for the city.	07:12:40
13	That's the problem. The problem is a	07:12:42
14	question of his fundamental program. And so the	07:12:44
15	question of having to fight that program is the	07:12:48
16	heart of what we have to be about. And, frankly, I	07:12:50
17	want to say that there's no organization in this	07:12:53
18	city that's more willing to fight the program of	07:12:55
19	privatizing our schools, keeping taxes low for the	07:12:58
20	wealthy, and gutting our neighborhoods and schools	07:13:00
21	than the Chicago Teachers Union. Let us have that	07:13:03
22	fight. That's a fight that we want. We want that	07:13:05
23	fight.	07:13:07
24	Not about Rauner personally. This isn't,	07:13:09

1 you know, a name calling match. This is about 07:13:12
2 fighting the program of privatizing our schools. 07:13:14
3 what I do have to say, though, is this 07:13:19
4 Board of the Chicago Public Schools and the Mayor 07:13:21
5 that appoints it has failed to do everything in its 07:13:24
6 power to take that fight to the Governor. I just 07:13:28
7 got to call it like we see it. 07:13:30
8 Rauner's personal fortune grew 07:13:32
9 \$176 million, \$176 million in 2015. 07:13:34
10 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Mr. Sharkey? 07:13:40

10	Jackson, 49,000.	07:14:48
11	I am a mother who has been fighting for	07:14:49
12	special education for my son, for my son, who	07:14:51
13	before, especially he has low self-esteem problems	07:14:54
14	and suffer from panic attacks. As a parent that	07:14:59
15	comes from the Pilsen community, we are battling	07:15:01
16	many issues like gentrification, and now we're	07:15:05
17	battling with more budget cuts and after-school	07:15:09
18	programs are disappearing. Plus our schools have	07:15:11
19	lead problems.	07:15:13
20	We are outraged that Rauner, Rahm, my own	07:15:15
21	alderman, Danny Solis, and many public officials	07:15:20
22	are not trying to find any solutions to those	07:15:25
23	problems. We know that Chicago is not broke.	07:15:27
24	There is money. They're out there. We have TIF	07:15:30

1 money. There are a lot of corporations that are 07:15:35
2 getting tax credits. We need to have our 07:15:38
3 priorities straight. 07:15:42
4 How is it possible that there is money to 07:15:44
5 build new charter schools, things like the Chelsea 07:15:46
6 606 or, in the case of Pilsen, El Paseo, but there 07:15:49
7 is no money to fund the schools that we already 07:15:53
8 have. 07:15:56
9 And also how do you base those cuts? How 07:15:57
10 is that it our black and Latino communities are 07:16:00
11 getting the most cuts? 07:16:02

13 daughter. She doesn't see. She can't walk on her 07:17:25
14 own. She doesn't talk on her own. And she relies 07:17:27
15 on other people to get her to the bathroom, to help 07:17:31
16 her eat, and if she doesn't have an aide at school, 07:17:34
17 she's not doing any of that. So if you can imagine 07:17:38
18 being not able to see, being stuck in a wheelchair, 07:17:43
19 and being forced to have to use the washroom in 07:17:46
20 your pants, that's not dignified. 07:17:49
21 If you could please find other solutions 07:17:52
22 than to cutting special education. It's really 07:17:55
23 important. Thank you. 07:17:57
24 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, sir. Our next 07:17:59

1 speaker, please, Gregory Goodman. 07:18:01

2 MR. GOODMAN: Good afternoon. Good evening. 07:18:04

3 Gregory Goodman. I'm a social studies teacher at 07:18:09

4 Lindblom Math and Science Academy. 07:18:12

5 On the CPS web site or on the page that's 07:18:15

6 dedicated to talking about your mission statement, 07:18:17

7 there's actually -- it starts with a quote from 07:18:18

8 CEO Claypool and it says, All of our children want 07:18:19

9 to succeed and it is our job to see if they can. 07:18:22

10 This is actually one of these rare instances where 07:18:25

11 you and I are in perfect agreement. It usually 07:18:27

12 goes downhill from here. 07:18:29

13 As a teacher in CPS, we spend a lot of 07:18:32

14 time having people who've never spent a day in the 07:18:34

15 classroom coming in and telling us how to do our 07:18:36

16 job. So I figured it was appropriate for me to 07:18:38

17 come back and maybe tell you a little bit about how 07:18:40

18 you're doing your job wrong. Okay. 07:18:41

19 As members of this Board, right, as our 07:18:45

1 again. I will. But we need you guys to 07:20:07
2 actually -- 07:20:09
3 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Mr. Goodman? 07:20:10
4 MR. GOODMAN: -- fight for our students. when 07:20:10
5 you actually take this job, right, it doesn't 07:20:12
6 matter -- I understand most of you are rich people, 07:20:14
7 right, and these are the people you're used to 07:20:16
8 identifying with and working with, but when you 07:20:18
9 take on this job, you take on a responsibility to 07:20:19
10 put things aside and fight for our schools. 07:20:22
11 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Thank you, Mr. Goodman. 07:20:25
12 MR. GOODMAN: I have a revision assignment. 07:20:26

8 continuing to see me come to these meetings. 07:21:23

9 I'm also a special ed parent, and I just 07:21:26
10 want to say, thanks to extra help, my son graduated 07:21:28

13 right. He does not have the courage to apply to 07:21:40
14 CPS because he's seen how the teachers have been 07:21:44
15 demeaned and vilified, laid off. He just is going 07:21:47
16 to stay in the private schools for now because it 07:21:53
17 is such a difficult climate. 07:21:57

18 A lot of what I want to say has already 07:22:00
19 been said. I know that the state is remiss, but 07:22:02
20 there is money in the city, and we need to come up 07:22:06
21 with some progressive revenue sources to fund our 07:22:10
22 schools. Right now you can get away with shitting 07:22:12
23 on the most vulnerable, but it's going to come back 07:22:19
24 to bite you because now everybody is being affected 07:22:21

1 by this. Gen ed is affected when special ed is 07:22:24
2 cut. 07:22:28
3 So today I heard that Northside College 07:22:29
4 Prep, one of your flagship schools, failed the food 07:22:33
5 safety inspections. Can you please stop 07:22:37
6 privatizing the ancillary services? Nursing, the 07:22:39
7 janitorial services, now engineering. How does 07:22:44
8 that affect the safety of our students when we have 07:22:48
9 lesser trained people being paid less to come in 07:22:51
10 and take care of these vital services? 07:22:54
11 My grandson needs bilingual services, but 07:22:57
12 with student-based budgeting, his principal can't 07:23:00
13 afford to give him the kind of services he needs. 07:23:03
14 He's also special ed. So you got all these 07:23:06
15 different needs that are not being met and white, 07:23:10
16 middle class people are going to start rebelling 07:23:14
17 against it. We need an elected school board. We 07:23:16

6	You can no longer drive a wedge between	07:25:00

8	As charter school teachers organize network by	07:25:05

18	If the funding is not here now, find it, advocate	07:25:35
19	for it. All of our city students are counting on	07:25:38

10	You have money for bogus contracts where	07:29:02
11	Barbara Byrd took the fall for, but, yet, again, we	07:29:06
12	don't have money for our children at our schools.	07:29:09
13	You pick and choose who gets a good education or	07:29:13
14	not. That's why all these parents every year file	07:29:17
15	in for selective enrollment because everybody is	07:29:20
16	fighting to have a good education for their	07:29:24
17	children.	07:29:26
18	All schools should have all the same	07:29:27
19	resources that you should be able to send your	07:29:29
20	child to their own schools in their neighborhood	07:29:32
21	and everybody is the same across the board. Not	07:29:33
22	based on your ZIP Code, not based on, oh, in the	07:29:36
23	lottery. Everybody should have the same education.	07:29:41
24	It shouldn't matter of your color, special needs	07:29:43

1 children. Everybody should get a good education. 07:29:47
2 SECRETARY BELTRAN: Ms. White? 07:29:51
3 MS. WHITE: We are going to keep fighting until 07:29:53
4 you all do the right thing. Stop not putting our 07:29:55
5 children first and put our children first. Thank 07:29:58

4 from unfair immigration policies. We need 07:33:17
5 counselors and provide training for teachers to 07:33:19
6 learn and understand how to be supportive in 07:33:21

22 because it gets me into a job, a job that can 07:34:07
23 prepare me, a job that, unlike you, I would be able 07:34:10
24 to do right. 07:34:13

1 I'm grateful for the donation to get a new 07:34:15
2 part of the building to my selective enrollment 07:34:17
3 school, but the floors are peeling off. Our sink 07:34:20
4 for chemistry didn't even work until now. It 07:34:22
5 really takes that long to fix a sink? We lost 07:34:24
6 \$167,000, and that money we could have used to 07:34:29
7 repair our building. We need to repair our schools 07:34:33
8 and for our student safety. And this is selective 07:34:35
9 enrollment schools. Imagine the problems with the 07:34:38
10 other schools. We don't even have enough money for 07:34:40
11 necessities like toilet paper. Toilet paper. 07:34:42
12 But the biggest question out there is 07:34:44
13 where is all this money going to? It's going to 07:34:46
14 the new building. Buildings are not just for show. 07:34:49
15 Maybe we spend money on charter schools, charter 07:34:52
16 schools that don't even affect students as much as 07:34:54
17 greatly as CPS schools. That money belongs to us, 07:34:56
18 and we will stand for it. We will fight for it and 07:34:59
19 we will continue to fight until all of our money is 07:35:05
20 returned. 07:35:07

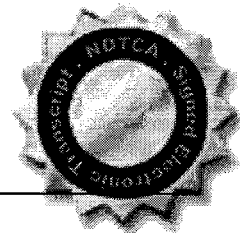
