





The DFSS Workforce Division designates resources to coordinate workforce services that meet disadvantaged Chicago residents' unique needs. The division is increasingly applying an equitable, trauma-informed approach to delivering workforce services at the neighborhood level to advance healthy and supportive communities.

Number of delegate agencies: 51 Number of program models: 4

Highlights

- Improves employment outcomes for Chicago's most vulnerable residents through three primary models:
 - Community Reentry Support Centers
 - Employment Preparation and Placement
 - Industry-Specific training programs
 - Transitional Jobs (Subsidized Work-based Learning) programs



Workforce Services Division

- Community Reentry Support Centers: Central locations where residents with criminal
 justice involvement can receive the advocacy and support, they may need to transition
 back into their communities and the workforce. These services provide participants
 with employment and training to move forward and succeed in life.
- Employment Preparation & Placement Program: Job readiness training to prepare clients to obtain and retain employment, and then support them on their journey from placement to and through at least 180 days of employment.
- Industry Specific Training Program: Training experience in high-demand industries with clear pathways to progressively higher skill and wage levels (e.g., Hospitality, Transportation, Distribution and Logistics (TDL), Healthcare, Manufacturing, and IT).
- Transitional Jobs Program: Subsidized employment opportunities coupled with intensive wraparound services and skills development.



Program Eligibility

Target Population

DFSS provides workforce services to individuals facing employment barriers who are unemployed or underemployed, low-income, and have limited work skills. Eligible individuals must be 18 years of age or older, city of Chicago residents, low-to-moderate income*, and authorized to work in the United States.

In addition, DFSS focuses on serving the following three *priority* populations:

- Homeless Individuals
- Individuals with limited-English proficiency
- Returning Residents

Candidate Pool

Could you provide an example of how DFSS has successfully implemented a pipeline strategy in the past to support workforce development within the Early Childhood Sector?	DFSS can utilize the IST Program Model and delegate agencies to establish a comprehensive curriculum blending Job Readiness Training (JRT) with industry-specific skills training. Participants would earn credentials aligned with various positions in the Early Childhood Sector. Simultaneously, the TJP program could offer subsidized training, Work-Based Learning (WBL), or On-the-Job Training (OJT) tailored to available positions. Delegates would administer JRT, while ECRC sector employers would provide hands-on experience and specialized training. This approach ensures a seamless transition from education to employment, equipping participants with both theoretical knowledge and practical skills essential for success in the workforce. Delegates would also provide wraparound supports to participants.

- A little about the Chicago ECEC landscape, including the funding and regulatory structures that make it complicated;

- 4. Where to find those data, what to keep in mind when you are looking at data and using them; and where to turn for additional support.

WHAT ARE DATA? WHY DO I NEED TO USE DATA?

•Key Takeaways:

- Data are information. When we say "data," what we really mean is information. Data are organized systematically and can take many forms.
- 2. Most data you consume have been interpreted. Whenever data are reported in written descriptions, tables, maps, or graphs, someone has interpreted that data for you. The people who have made these choices bring their own priorities and perspectives—which may be similar or different from your own.
- **3. Using data is critical.** Data and reporting are critical tools for understanding, learning about, and improving Chicago's ECEC system.

THE CHICAGO ECEC LANDSCAPE IS DIVERSE AND COMPLEX

Key Takeaways:

- 1. ECEC funding is complex. In Chicago, we have a mix of federal, state, and local dollars that support ECEC programming. Often, programs braid and blend multiple funding sources.
- 2. Regulations are complex. This section describes the main funding sources that support ECEC programming in Chicago and provides an overview of the types of regulations that are attached to each funding source.

ECEC DATA REFLECT THE ECEC LANDSCAPE

Key Takeaways:

- 1. Data are created for compliance. Most of the data we have about Chicago's ECEC system are created by programs to demonstrate their compliance with funding and regulations.
- **2. Agencies use data for regulation.** Agencies generally only collect data about what they regulate from the programs they are responsible for regulating.
- **3. Data are siloed.** As a result, data are often siloed by agency, and at the same time, children and programs frequently appear in multiple datasets.
- **4. Data are rich.** Administrative datasets frequently include key characteristics of the children and families, the workforce, settings and programs, funding and resources, and assessments of quality and achievement at the center,

USE DATA OFTEN, CAREFULLY, AND RESPONSIBLY

- •Key Takeaways:
- 1. **Define your questions.** When you are looking for data, first identify the population or program you're interested in, and then track it back to funding streams to determine which agency or agencies might hold the data you are looking for.
- 2. Be specific. Always be precise about what a number is measuring.
- **3. Respect confidentiality.** Attend to issues of confidentiality and privacy when dealing with ECEC data.
- **4. Get curious.** There are several efforts currently underway to advance our city and state's early childhood data infrastructure to make data more useful.
- **5. Engage experts.** Some questions are more complex than a data point can answer. This is where the tools and methods of research can be helpful.


